## Successful Earth Day and Plant Sale Events

More people worked with FOSC on Earth Day than ever before. Together with Michelle Doppelt, the wonderful new Recreation Center Coordinator, we had 125 people at Dimond Park to work on a variety of projects. Over 40 hands went to work pulling introduced ivy from oak trees in Dimond Park. The "Ivy Beleaguers" were inspired by the loss of the Dimond Oak, the oldest oak in Oakland, and determined to see that its acorn progeny were not smothered or choked by entwining vines of Algerian and English Ivy. Strands were pulled down from the oaks, and a "donut" of open ground was cleared around the trees.



The Demonstration Garden was weeded and mulched under the watchful eye of Michael Thilgen. Overgrown trails were renewed and spruced up. The area of Dimond Canyon between the creek and the new native plantings on the creek's west side saw the removal of a strip of non-native Cape ivy. Elliott Smith's team removed an incredible amount of acacia and broom on the west side of the canyon. (*Elliott Smith tragically died in a skiing accident on May 16, more will be devoted to him in the next issue.*) The Burmester team built a small wooden bridge and reshaped the drainage area. President Eleanor Dunn led a Kid Krew, who looked at bugs in the creek, mulched along the trail, and potted up some seedlings for the kidlets to take home.

The bi-annual trash and debris clean up at Barry Place on East 27th St. is paying off, thanks to John Bowers and Sheelah Weaver. The volume of rubbish to clean up is decreasing and the Barry Place volunteers planted creekside species to add native diversity to the creek bed. Up at the Joaquin Miller Native Plant Nursery, we built 12 tables for plants and installed steps for a trail up to

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the scenic overlook. We cleaned out and enclosed the shade house, weeded and tidied much of our plant stock.

Speaking of nursery, our first-ever native plant sale was a huge success—over 500 people visited the nursery, buying about \$6K worth of native plants, donating another \$1K to FOSC. A heartfelt "thanks" goes out to all the volunteers and leaders who came out for both events. See you next year! —Mark Rauzon

## Friend of the Month—Ralph Kanz

Rare plant species live in the Sausal Creek watershed. At its headwaters, there is a dying stand of pallid manzanita. The next ridge over, going south, there are stands of endangered Presidio clarkia, an 'annual' which is often weed-whipped prior to seed set. The legislation in place to theoretically protect these and other listed species, the federal Endangered Species Act and the California Environmental Quality Act, has little official local enforcement. What stands between these species and extinction is Ralph Kanz, FOSC volunteer extraordinaire. Ralph combines intimate knowledge of the species' needs and last known locations with astute political skills, knowledge of the law and official contacts. For his tireless monitoring, documenting, and calling attention to these plants of special concern in our own backyard, we nominate Ralph Kanz as our Friend of the Month. The Barry Place project thanks Ralph for his fearless canopy opening work on Earth Day.
